The Surfrider Foundation is dedicated to the protection and enjoyment of the world's oceans, waves and beaches. Since its inception in the early 1980's, Surfrider has established a powerful activist network not just of surfers and watermen, but has grown to encompass all that recreate in and around our oceans and beaches. In fact, the name originated from protecting a place, the globally iconic Surfrider Beach in Malibu.

Now in its 36th year, Surfrider has evolved into one of the largest environmental non-profit organizations in the world. In the US, Surfrider is comprised of 81 local Chapters, 86 Student Clubs and over one million supporters and volunteers, all serving as local responders to costal threats. Surfrider's model starts with local awareness and activation to effect policy change at the regional and national levels around 5 key areas: Beach Access, Clean Water, Ocean Protection, Costal Preservation and Plastic Pollution. So far in 2020, Surfrider has accomplished 26 policy victories with 668 since 2006.

Locally, the Newport Beach Chapter of Surfrider is dedicated to protecting the beaches we all love on the Balboa

Peninsula. The City of Newport is both blessed and challenged with nearly 8 million visitors each year, most of which make their way to the beach.

Surfrider Foundation Continued...

The activities of the Newport Chapter focus largely on the never-ending task of keeping our 10-mile stretch of beaches clean.

Beach trash is not only a result of humanity, but also from marine debris floating in the ocean making its way to the beaches via ocean currents and prevailing on shore winds. Much of the water-borne marine debris flows from the Santa Ana River, the largest watershed in Southern California, stretching 100 miles from the Newport-Huntington border to the San Gabriel Mountains. In 2019, the Newport Chapter and its dedicated volunteers removed over 7,700 pounds of trash from our beaches – remarkable, as most of the trash collected is plastic and Styrofoam which weighs next to nothing.

Plastic ocean pollution has become a global crisis. An estimated 5.25 trillion pieces of plastic are currently floating in the ocean, with an additional 8 million tons of plastic



entering the world's oceans each year. Battling plastic ocean pollution is priority one for the Surfrider Foundation and its network of Chapters and Student Clubs. The Newport Chapter, through its various monthly events and beach cleanups, endeavors to spread awareness and educate the local community as to how we can all make a dent in this issue. Two active members of Surfrider from the Balboa Peninsula Point Neighborhood are John Wadsworth (Vice Chair of the Surfrider Newport Beach Chapter) and Aaron Behle (Chairman of the Surfrider National BOD).
